## The mystery of Shakespeare's identity

**A.** William Shakespeare, the poet and dramatist we know as the Bard of Avon, has contributed immeasurably to the culture of the British Isles and beyond. This prolific author wrote 37 plays, 154 sonnets and contributed over 1700 new words to the English language. Often quoted and misquoted, he regularly appears in the top ten Britons of all time and occupies a place in the hearts of literature lovers across the world. But what if all is not as it seems? Skeptics started questioning the true identity of Shakespeare in the late 19th century. Suspicion was first raised in academic circles and has increasingly gained ground over the last century. Astonishingly, the William Shakespeare conspiracy theory proposes that the beloved writer was, in fact, a fake, and his works were written by somebody else.

**B.** Born in 1564 in Stratford-upon-Avon, England, William Shakespeare seemed destined to follow in his father's footsteps as a glover, but his life took an unexpected turn. The young William received a grammar school education, which ended in his midteens. By the time he was eighteen, Shakespeare was married and children soon followed. Shortly afterward he abandoned his wife and three children and moved to London to become a member of a leading London theatre company. Almost immediately his plays began to appear on the London stage, and soon he gained fame and admiration as one of the best writers of his generation. In 1616, Shakespeare died unexpectedly at the age of 52, leaving behind a large body of work.

**C.** So, why do many academics want to prove that the Bard of Avon was, in fact a fake? The answer lies in Shakespeare's background. Incredibly, some are skeptical that a man of Shakespeare's relatively modest academic and social background could have the breadth of knowledge and talent to write so prolifically and with such knowledge on so many subjects. Shakespeare's

plays depict in detail Elizabethan court life and show a wide knowledge of arts, music and travel. Evidence found in his works proves that the author of the plays was a highly educated, multilingual expert in the law, who had read a wide range of both ancient Greek and Latin texts. And yet, our Stratford man was no nobleman. He was from a lower middle-class family with a provincial background and no university education.

**D.** But if Shakespeare didn't write the plays attributed to him, who did? The mystery deepens further. Doubting scholars look to well-travelled writers and aristocrats – like the philosopher and essayist Sir Francis Bacon and the poet and playwright Christopher Marlowe as more likely candidates. However, the strongest competitor in the greatest manhunt in literary history is Edward de Vere, the 17th Earl of Oxford – a poet and courtier with intimate knowledge of the court life of Elizabeth I. He was a prominent and influential theatre patron who travelled widely. One idea is that Edward de Vere wrote under the pen name of William Shakespeare because due to the high nature of his birth, it would have been impossible for him to reveal himself as a common playwright.

**E.** So, was this son of a tradesman really the stunning genius that contributed so much to British culture and the English language? Or was he a fake, an actor who struck lucky when an unknown aristocrat asked him to take the credit for his work to avoid social embarrassment? The consensus of most academics is that William Shakespeare, the Bard of Avon, truly was the greatest writer in the English language. Despite this, the William Shakespeare conspiracy theory refuses to die because so little is known of Shakespeare's life.

**F.** One thing is for sure - unlike most of us, Shakespeare would know how to disprove his critics and silence his doubters. Perhaps he might have also suggested that the world should focus on the work itself and not its authorship. In the words of one of his own characters 'What's in a name? That which we call a rose by any other name would smell as sweet.' After all, this could be much ado about nothing. Or maybe, one day, the truth will come out. As Charles Dickens put it, 'The life of Shakespeare is a fine mystery, and I tremble every day lest something should turn up.'
